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That is excellent news. I have a few comments:

1): I am aware of the abandoned Ubuntu spinoff meant for embedded systems that never really saw the light of day. However, some searches have brought up a few other Freenix references. These may or may not be problematic, I just wanted to bring them to our attention so that they don't catch us off guard in the future. I don't think any of these present problems for the FSF endorsement, but they still might be worth keeping on the radar, just in case.

A current, active project is the FreeNIX Security Labs, offering "Penetration Testing and Free Software", whose site has seen activity as recently as January of this year. Might not be an issue, but they do seem current, active, and in a similar field.

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Thanks for the additional pair of eyes on this diligence ... you found most of the things that I also found in my vetting of the name.

One additional thing I found was a French guy that owns the "freenix.org" domain, but I was able to determine that he only uses it for one personal/private email address, and even that isn't his primary email address. I've contacted him once, and he just kinda vaguely brushed off my plea to acquire the domain. I'm hoping that with the extra "street-cred" of our actual distribution naming/branding, I may be able to convince him.

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The "freenix.com" domain is parked with a domain squatter ... I've actually submitted an offer to buy it, but no response yet. Obviously, I won't be willing to pay much for it, but I wanted to see how committed the squatter is, with the intent of waiting him out, and alot of badgering

All in all, I'm convinced that the viable presence around any "freenix" naming/branding has been basically non-existent, and so with just a bit of time and continued activity/progress around our product, we'll become entrenched in the "freenix" real-estate.

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I finally had some time to rework the wording and images a bit. Now we have a Freenix front end that looks like this:

which I do own/control. So, yes, we can continue to use that as an alternative domain, it doesn't expire until some time in 2020 I believe. I just figured we wanted to separate ourselves as much from the "freeslack" name.... "It's a conspiracy man, they're trying to take away all of our SLACK!"

I've made the site entirely static; only html, css, and images (i.e. no scripts at all) plus all of the local links are relative, which means you can just unpack this archive:

into any web directory and it should work out of the box without any tweaking.

I admit, some of the images could use a reworking. I'm not a graphics guy, it's not my strong point. However, images can easily be replaced, not a problem if we come up with some nicer images to go with the text and links.

Feedback is welcome, I've just been strapped for spare time these past few months. Hopefully this summer will allow for play time.
